To Whom It May Concern,

We have recently learned that a vehicle in your possession (which we believe you repossessed) will constitute important evidence in an upcoming legal case. Specifically, a 2016 Kia Sportage was involved in a collision on January 7, 2020. Its driver, [REDACTED], was hurt very badly. During the crash, [REDACTED] broke several ribs and suffered injuries to her neck and back. The injuries kept her in the intensive care unit for over two weeks. In order to handle [REDACTED] legal case, our law firm needs to get access to the vehicle so we can prove how the collision happened.

The Kia Sportage's VIN is KNDPB3AC3G7866408. The license plate number is RSQ5269. The vehicle was leased to [REDACTED] under Account No. 3UGA6PEC. The collision occurred near the intersection of Roswell Road and Maryeanna Drive in Sandy Springs, Georgia. We believe that you repossessed the vehicle from a lot operated by a company called "A Tow," which is located at 11412 N Fulton Industrial Boulevard in Alpharetta, GA, 30009.

Please preserve the vehicle in its current state. Please do not scrap, repair, modify, sell, or transfer the vehicle. Please allow our firm to inspect the vehicle and take the necessary pictures. If preserving the vehicle causes any inconvenience to your company, we are happy to pay any reasonable fee or storage cost, and we will return the vehicle to you as soon as we can.

Thank you so much. I suspect that you would preserve the vehicle anyway, but please note that failing to preserve evidence that will be needed in legal proceedings (like this vehicle) can lead to severe, adverse legal consequences. *AMLI Residential Props., Inc. v. Georgia Power Co.*, 293 Ga. App. 358, 363 (2008).
